Guests line up in our parking lot as they await the shuttle buses that will take them up Snelling Avenue to the State Fairgrounds. As part of our State Fair Water Welcome, members of Gloria Dei greet them as they wait and send them off to the fair with a bottle of water.

Thor Carlson, Jon Kavanaugh, and Steve Teipel are three leaders who help make our Water Welcome a success. Each of them has spent many hours in our parking lot greeting guests and giving away ice-cold water.

"One nice byproduct of volunteering for Water Welcome is hearing great Gloria Dei anecdotes from people waiting in line for the bus," Thor said. "Whether they came for holiday services or a wedding, a community meeting or some other event, many people let you know how they've been touched by Gloria Dei."

But I hope that those fairgoers who are the recipients of this little gesture of hospitality recognize it for what it is: a free gift they have done nothing to deserve, offered to them no-questions-asked, for no other reason than we believe they are children of God who wants them to be able to experience the goodness and abundance of ice-cold water on a hot summer day.

# **Pine Ridge Youth Mission Trip 2019**

During the weeklong youth mission trip in June to South Dakota's Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, 10 Gloria Dei (GDLC) teens and three GDLC adults bonded, grew in faith and made new legend stories. Katie LeClair said, "As the youth director, it was exciting to see older teens shepherd and guide younger teens in this experience and share their legend stories."

Legend stories are about those memorable moments, good or not, that live on and are fun to pass on. Like a good fish story, the telling of it may get 'bigger' with each passing year. On this trip, the "apocalyptic bunker" that housed them and the lack of any hot water, may create legend stories.

They joined nearly 100 campers from five churches across America to help with roofing projects, an outdoor shed double-door, and insulating the inside of a Lakota elder's house. All in full sunshine with over 90 degree temperatures. Maybe it was good it was so warm since they had only **cold** water for showers.



Ten Gloria Dei teens, grades 7-12, at Red Cloud Indian School and its church. They visited the museum and gift shop. The annual Red Cloud Indian Art Show is the largest and longest running Native American art show of its kind in the country, and one of only a few held on an indigenous reservation hundreds of miles from any urban area.

The group learned about Lakota culture, saw the Wounded Knee Massacre site and heard community members speak about life on the Pine Ridge reservation. They met and shopped with local artisans. and visited the Red Cloud Indian School and museum.

"I learned about the lack of jobs on the reservation, about how the people lived on the reservation and what their living conditions were like," said recent high school graduate Eric Heffelfinger.

Eric encourages future trip participants to immerse themselves in the experience to fully enjoy it. Emma Goulet, another recent high school grad said these trips test you mentally and physically. "You never know what the other people are going to be like or your worksite, so it's important to be able to stay positive and look on the bright side, which can be hard. Trust your group because you need them. It's exhausting and tough but the trips are worth it," she said.

Juliet Cherry, eighth grader, said what surprised her about the reservation was, "just how much Monna [homeowner] knew, and how hands-on she was. How poor they were and how hungry they looked when they got food from Next Step during the Artisan market night."

On Friday, their last full day, they took a two-hour ATV tour at Edelweiss Mountain Lodging in the Badlands. The day ended with a community cookout with Indian Tacos and Fry Bread. At 7 a.m. Saturday morning, June 29, they left for home and arrived 12 hours later.

They appreciate everyone's support and prayers before and during the trip. Special shout out to adult members Marshall Saunders and Ben Bowman for being part of the trip. Check out the trip pictures and videos.

About this trip Emma said, "As a stranger I was always greeted with kindness, which says a lot about the Lakota culture. I met a 2-year-old named Precious who gave me a cold bottle of water without being told. Her house does not have running water so they rely on hose water and

bottled water. Precious is an example of the Lakota culture."

The first three nights, severe storms forced them to shelter in an indoor structure down the road. "Seeing those storms roll in was

quite a sight!" said Katie. "This was another time when friendships across grades 7-12 really happened. Really fun for me as a youth director to see!"













Juliet and Garret built and installed these doors on a garden shed. They learned how to measure, make sure things are level, how to install hinges, how to drill (and un-drill) and how to install a lock. They ran out of paint before they could finish.

- **15** junior leader children (grades 5-6) jumped to help or be involved as much as possible, and impressed us all. They worked hard in the kitchen to get the snacks prepared. My favorite part was watching them on stage, either leading the prayer, teaching the Bible verse actions or singing songs.
- **39** youth volunteers were great role models to the participants, and the children looked up to our amazing youth volunteers. One morning as a preschooler did an obstacle course, a teenage boy

- right on the sidelines cheered her on by name. A perfect example of what Gloria Dei youth do for VBS.
- **42** adult volunteers decorated, prepped their stations, taught the children, and helped the youth volunteers engage with the children. They take strong ownership of VBS that shows in the great reputation our program has in the community.
- **8** staff members made meals and nametags, took pictures, gave tours and cleaned up. Pastor Javen played Irving Carter in the skit, and Pastor Bradley was even the MC.
- **238** total members and staff directly involved in VBS! We are grateful for all the children and volunteers, and everyone who donated items to make this week possible. What fun to see everyone come together for a week of learning, laughing, singing and creating!

## Sanctuary Renewal Update

Over the past few months, Gloria Dei members have gathered after worship, over coffee or with a Dilly Bar on a couple of hot summer nights to discuss the proposed Sanctuary Renewal project. Thank you to all who were part of our discussions. A special thank you to the volunteer committee who tirelessly gave up their summer nights and weekends to meet and listen to comments and feedback on the draft Master Plan.

Much has been done since the draft plan was presented to the congregation on May 18, 2019. Here's a brief update of where we are:

- Nearly 200 members have provided feedback or participated in a feedback session.
- 23 volunteers have been involved across three planning teams to transform the 2018 congregational vision into a detailed project proposal in 2019.
- The Design Team is in the process of incorporating the congregation's feedback into the overall design.
- A feasibility audit is being conducted to provide information and a recommendation for overall budget and funding options.

#### **Next Steps**

Once we complete the feasibility study and have a funding plan in place, we will move toward a congregational vote to commence a campaign to fund the Sanctuary Renewal. The church leadership believes it's prudent to secure a strong annual appeal and build momentum prior to approving the vision to commence fundraising for the Sanctuary Renewal. With that in mind, we look forward to sharing more updates with the congregation in September and October. In the meantime, if you have thoughts, considerations or questions regarding the specific design or the overall project, please let me know.

And again, thank you so much for your continued interest in renewing the worship space that we all share and love.

## Neighborhood House Skills for School Preschool

Beginning this fall, the halls of Gloria Dei will be full with preschool children's voices during the week. The Neighborhood House Skills for School will use one of our Sunday School classrooms for three afternoons a week to provide a free preschool for children 3-5 years old.

Skills for School helps the youngest participants in Neighborhood House develop the skills they need to enter kindergarten. For most of the preschoolers, it is their first time in a classroom and away from their families. Many are learning English for the first time.

The lessons, developed by the Neighborhood House licensed Early Childhood Educator, touch on critical areas of development for preschool aged children and are paired with Early Childhood Home Visits to extend learning and skill-building beyond the classroom. The focus is to:

- Promote social emotional regulation.
- Help foster positive peer interactions.
- Inspire curiosity in problem-solving.
- Encourage symbolic thinking.
- Explore the alphabet—skills like phonological awareness, and knowledge and identification of letters and their sounds.
- Nurture emerging reading and writing skills.
- Teach number concepts and operations like counting, quantifying and connecting numerals with their quantities.

This partnership not only uses Gloria Dei space that is often empty during the week, it also provides a ministry of hospitality for Neighborhood House, these children and their families. We are excited to be part of a great place for the children to learn and have fun.

Neighborhood House is a multi-service agency that provides wrap-around services for families
